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Stella “Touches” Local Pet Owners

Paws-Ability’s *Stella’s Touch* program, initiated in June, 2017, is designed to work with pets of owners who are experiencing physical or financial hardship. These pets need veterinary care or routine day-to-day care that the owner simply cannot afford or perform. These pets are often surrendered to a shelter or rescue group with the hope that they can be treated or rehomed.

Stella’s Touch was made possible with a donation from a family who wanted to make a difference in our community. They chose to name the program to honor their beloved schnauzer, Stella. This family recognized the importance of Stella in *their* lives and could not imagine a family’s pain when watching a pet suffer during a time of family crisis.

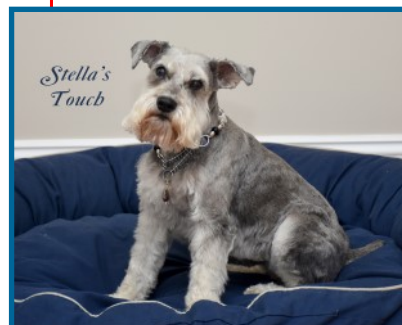
Paws-Ability has reached out to churches and service groups asking for assistance to find these pet owners asking their members to spread the word and encourage individuals to apply for financial aid to help with veterinary costs through the *Stella’s Touch* program. The program’s objective is to keep pets with their owners and support the animal-human bond.

To date, Stella to date has ‘touched’ 30 families by assisting with the care of their family pet. The situations incurred run the gamut of topics from sharing an owner’s cost of flea and heart-worm meds, leg amputations, and gum disease and tooth extractions. In some cases, the costs are shared between Stella and the pet owner. In addition, if the pet needs to undergo surgery and had not been spayed or neutered, Stella will fund that procedure also. Not only have the pets’ needs run the gamut, but also the owners’ personal situations.

We’ve supported both cats and dogs; little dogs and big dogs, and mother cats with their kittens.

There was the case of a veteran who had a family pet with a leg problem that required surgery. A local veterinarian told the family about *Stella’s Touch*, and they applied for assistance. The application was reviewed and accepted and surgery was performed. Both the dog and the family are now happy campers.

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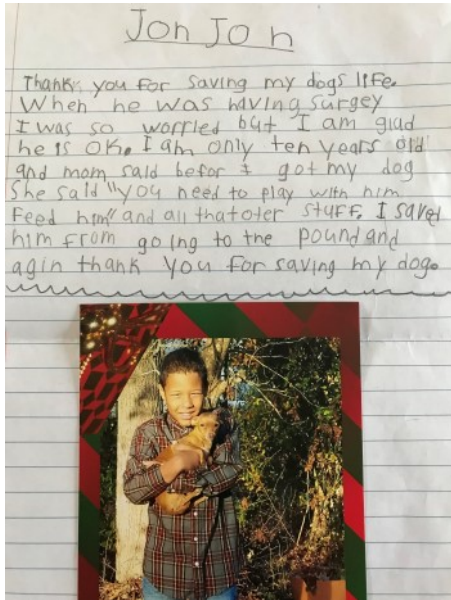


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Stella's Touch—continued

Another special case involves a family and pet both going through difficult medical challenges. The pet owner and mother of two was undergoing chemotherapy for breast cancer. Their small dog was important to the family. When taken to the vet, the family learned that the dog had dental disease, the pain of which was preventing it from eating. A parishioner at the church where the family worships referred them to *Stella's Touch*. One child in particular was very attached to the dog, using it for emotional support as his mother was undergoing treatments. He sent a picture of himself and a personal thank you to the program that touched both ours and our benefactor's heart strings.

In just a few short years, Fix a Friend Spay Neuter Clinic has completed more than 30,000 surgeries since its opening. As a result of the Mardi Gras 4 Paws, Paws-Ability was so very proud to present a check for \$5,000 to Jill Jones and Sherry Gloer of Adopt an Angel and Fix a Friend Spay Neuter Clinic. The monies helped to fund a \$25 special promotion in January and February during which the clinic completed nearly 1,300 surgeries — a record-breaking number for any low cost spay neuter clinic.

Spaying and neutering animals not only reduces the number of unwanted animals that enter our shelters and rescue groups, but also reduces the burden to taxpayers of destroying thousands of dogs and cats each year in Brunswick County. A single unaltered dog or cat can produce 4,000 kittens and puppies in a mere four years. Brunswick county alone will be forced to destroy more than 2,000 dogs and cats each year, simply because there are not enough homes for them. With fewer dogs and cats in our shelters, we can better care for those we have.

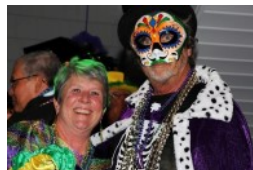

A Shelter Manager's Perspective

I think our society needs a huge "wake-up" call. As a shelter manager, I am going to give you a view from the "inside."

First off, all breeders/sellers should be made to work in the "back" of an animal shelter for just one day. Maybe if they saw the life drain from a few sad, lost, confused eyes, they would change their minds about breeding and selling animals.

That puppy they just sold will most likely end up in my shelter when it's not a cute little puppy anymore. There's about a 90% chance that a dog will never walk out of the shelter it is going to be dumped at, purebred or not! About 50% of all of the dogs that are "owner surrenders" or "strays" that come into my shelter are purebred dogs.

Odds are a pet won't get adopted and how stressful do you think being in a shelter is? Your pet has 72 hours to find a new family from the moment you drop it off. A pet will be confined to a small run/kennel in a room with about 25 other barking or crying animals. It will have to relieve itself where it eats and sleeps. It will be depressed and it will cry constantly for the family that abandoned it.

If a pet is lucky, I will have enough volunteers in that day to take him/her for a walk. If I don't, the pet won't get any attention besides having a bowl of food slid under the kennel door and the waste sprayed out of its pen with a high-powered hose. If a dog is big, black or any of the "Bully" breeds (pit bull, rottie, mastiff, etc.) it was pretty much dead when it walked through the front door. Those dogs just don't get adopted. It doesn't matter how

'sweet' or 'well behaved' they are.

If a dog doesn't get adopted within its 72 hours and the shelter is full, it will be destroyed. If the shelter isn't full and the dog is good enough and of a desirable enough breed, it may get a stay of execution, but not for long. Most dogs get very kennel protective after about a week and are destroyed for showing aggression. Even the sweetest dogs will turn in this environment. If a pet makes it over all of those hurdles, chances are it will get kennel cough or an upper respiratory infection and will be destroyed because shelters just don't have the funds to pay for even a \$100 treatment.

After a pet is euthanized, its corpse will be stacked like firewood in a large freezer in the back with all of the other animals that were killed waiting to be picked up like garbage. What happens next? Cremated? Taken to the dump? Rendered into pet food? You'll never know.

Between 9 and 11 *million* animals die every year in shelters. I do my best to save every life I can but rescues are always full, and there are more animals coming in every day than there are homes.

My point is: Don't breed or buy while shelter pets die!

I hope I may have changed one person's mind about breeding their dog, taking their loving pet to a shelter, or buying a dog. I hope that someone will walk into my shelter and say "I saw this and it made me want to adopt". THAT WOULD MAKE IT WORTH IT.

7 Ways to Help An Older Cat

1. Elevate the dishes. 
2. Help them get on furniture by using a stool.
3. Create an incentive to play. Fold up the ends of a cardboard toilet paper tube. Punch holes in the tube using a pencil. Put kibble in the tube so as the cat plays with the tube, the food comes out.
4. Help them with their grooming routine. Using sticky back tape, tape a pet brush onto the leg of a chair or table.
5. Replace a high-sided litter box with a low-sided box.
6. Use a night light as older cats may have trouble seeing at night.
7. Provide extra comfy places around the house with folded blankets and towels.

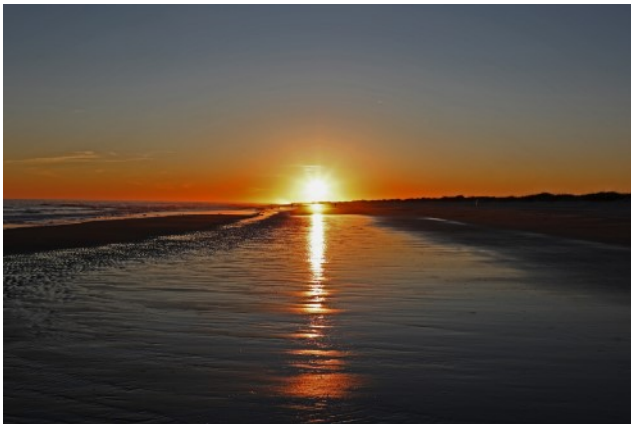
His other interests include golf and taking photos of wildlife and at the beach (mostly sunrise and sunset images).
